Greenwich in South East London has been chosen as the next venue for the AFMS conference. The dates are from the 3<sup>rd</sup> October to the 6<sup>th</sup> October 2012. Accommodation is in the Davenport House Hotel, a 4 star hotel and conference centre in the former nurses's home to the Seaman's Hospital.

Greenwich, soon to be Royal Greenwich as part of the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, is notable for its maritime history and for giving its name to the Greenwich Meridian (0° longitude) and Greenwich Mean Time. The town became the site of a royal palace, the Palace of Placentia from the 15th century, and was the birthplace of many in the House of Tudor, including Henry VIII and Elizabeth I. The palace fell into disrepair during the English Civil War and was rebuilt as the Royal Naval Hospital for Sailors by Sir Christopher Wren and his assistant Nicholas Hawksmoor. These buildings became the Royal Naval College in 1873, and they remained an establishment for military education until 1998 when they passed into the hands of the Greenwich Foundation. The historic rooms within these buildings remain open to the public; other buildings are used by the University of Greenwich and the Trinity College of Music.

The town became a popular resort in the 17th century and many grand houses were built there, such as Vanbrugh Castle (1717 - actually styled on the Bastille) established on Maze Hill, next to the park. From the Georgian period estates of houses were constructed above the town centre. Greenwich formed part of Kent until 1889 when the County of London was created.

Highlights of Greenwich include The Royal Observatory. The building designed by Christopher Wren, has exhibits on the history of timekeeping. The complex also includes a Planetarium and Greenwich Park that will be holding the equestrian events during the Olympics. The National Maritime Museum is at the North end of Greenwich Park and Greenwich Village, with its many pubs and eateries, is a three minute stroll from the hotel. The Cutty Sark tube station is within the Village and is named after the famous tea clipper, whose major refurbishment will be completed by the summer.

The social and scientific programmes are currently being put together and more details will be available with a booking form in the next newsletter.

### 20th Medical French Course

### Friday evening 23rd March to Sunday 25th March 2012

This long-established and highly-regarded course has an excellent new venue in the Conference Park on the Warwick University

campus, just outside Coventry. The facilities, general environment and accommodation are all first-class.

The aims of the course are designed to provide essential French medical vocabulary and the confidence to use it. Teaching is given in small tutorial groups (up to 8), each made up of students or doctors whose command of spoken French is similar. Teaching is carefully tailored to the standard of the group, which means that we can accommodate a wide range of capability in French – everything from rudimentary (GCSE/O-Level) to fluent. The tutors are all experienced teachers, who bring a variety of skills and backgrounds to the Course. They include doctors and other native French speakers, professional linguists,

the Course. They include doctors and other native French speakers, professional linguists, and UK-trained doctors who have worked clinically in a French-speaking setting. Participants at all levels find the Course extremely useful, including students preparing for an Erasmus exchange or an elective in a Francophone country, or doctors planning to work in France, Switzerland or for organisations such as Médecins sans Frontières. The 2012 Course will take a maximum of 40 doctors and 30 students.

### **AFMS Conference Report Winter Meeting 2012**

After some very cold hours on the slopes, walking, or shopping we met up for the medical portion of the conference.

Rod Storring, now working as a community consultant in respiratory medicine, updated us on the management of asthma and COPD by Primary Care. Unfortunately following guidelines doesn't seem to make any difference to measured outcome as those GPs not following guidelines had the same outcomes compared with those who did. This might be due to the different way doctors and nurses work. The former seem disinclined to use guidelines while the latter are excellent at following them. It is proposed that a more interactive approach to patient management with thinking outside the box guided by expert GP or specialist input would improve outcomes. We also discussed airway reactivity and what increases this; improving GP knowledge about these agents/ circumstances and how to modulate them.

Prof John Wilkinson discussed health outcomes in the French "DOM TOMs" using EU data from a project he was involved with. These areas, either Departments or Territories, are heterogeneous and have many health problems although life expectancy, whilst below France and UK is better than many EU countries. Nevertheless, infant mortality remains high; although it was noted to be generally better than parts of the USA....

Colin Mumford discussed the Moorgate tube crash and possible neurological causes of temporary impairment of the driver, it was a controversial inquiry and the Expert Witnesses were not specialists; hopefully things would be different today. Suicide seemed to be a strong possibility that the Inquiry did not consider due to the lack of Expert Witnesses. Our President talked on Britain's largest man who got to 500kg, we discussed the ethical and moral concerns surrounding the management of such patients. His mother was his "feeder" and might have benefited from psychological intervention before he put on so much weight that his health was affected.
