Other social activities include a River Thames boat trip and a visit to Savill Garden, a tranquil place to discover rare plants from around the world, arranged in stunning displays.

Our gala dinner will take place at Eton Rowing Club and for those staying on the Saturday, there will be a trip to Hampton Court Palace, the home of Henry VIII, and to Runnymede, where the Magna Carta was signed. The hotel is the Harte and Garter Hotel in Windsor High Street which overlooks the castle.
