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# Toulouse Group Visit the UK

As had happened last year, when Carol Barton hosted them in Reading, the French Group from Toulouse under the aegis of Dr. Michel Bismuth, once more visited this country.

They flew to Bristol, accompanied



by Andrea their teacher of English and stayed in Cardiff. On the afternoon of Friday 16th March, they were guests of Roger Celestin in Berkeley visiting Edward Jenner's past home, now a museum and a temple to vaccination. After a short film on Jenner's pioneering work, they visited the museum in which exhibits showed how in May 1796, Jenner tested the hypothesis that an inoculation of cowpox fluid from the post famous cow in history - Blossom - would protect a child from smallpox. Amongst those supporting vaccination already practised at the time, had been Voltaire (1694-1778) who held that some 60% of the population caught smallpox. A seminal event led to the eventual total eradication of smallpox declared by the WHO in 1979. The history of this eradication was not new to our Society, as in 1989 - ten years later - Sir Christopher Booth gave a superb British Council Lecture to the Toulouse AMFB Meeting entitled; "The Conquistadors of Smallpox" before our Gala Dinner.

The French group learnt that Jenner in 1770 had been an apprentice in London to the famous anatomist and surgeon John Hunter. The latter was in the army during the Seven Year War and was stationed in Belle Ile, off the coast of Brittany, occupied at the time by the British Army. Of interest to the group was that this was the place where Alexandre Dumas' père had set the characters that appeared in his novels of 'The Man in the Iron Mask' and 'The Three Musketeers'. There too Monet had painted their famous rocks. Hunter passed on to Jenner much of what he had learnt in the Army.

They also learnt that Jenner was interested in natural history and studied the life of the cuckoo as a hooligan in its host's nest! He was made, as a result, a Fellow of the Royal Society. The group also visited the Sasakawa Centre, the gift of a Japanese philanthropist, and had time to see the outside of Berkeley Castle. They then returned to Cardiff to attend the France v Wales rugby match. Many of them have either joined the AMFB or will do so and will attend the October meeting of the AFMS.

### Ightham Mote - National Trust Property KENT

The AFMS is pleased to announce that Ightham Mote will be visited on the Saturday afternoon of the conference. Described by the historian, David Starkey, as "one of the most beautiful and interesting of English country houses," Ightham Mote is the natural choice for the post conference tour. Ightham Mote lies in the rural Weald of Kent, near Sevenoaks. Dating from the early fourteenth century, the medieval moated manor house has seen many changes throughout its 700-year history, and has been owned by medieval knights, courtiers to Henry VIII and high society Victorians. Today, Ightham Mote is a Grade I Listed building and a Scheduled Ancient Monument, set within peaceful gardens, with an orchard, water features, lakes and woodland walks.

Donated to the National Trust in 1985 by Charles Henry-Robinson, the National Trust have ensured the survival of this important building through a £10 million, 15 year conservation programme. As a result, it is now possible to enjoy the Tudor Chapel with its 16th Century painted ceiling, the Drawing Room with Jacobean fireplace over-mantle and frieze, as well as the Victorian Billiard Room and more recently Mr. Robinson's apartment. The surrounding estate offers a wealth of lovely and interesting walks through farmland and woodland. It is sure to be a most interesting visit.



# **Obituary**

Sir Christopher Booth - who gave an outstanding talk on the Gala Evening of our Toulouse meeting in 1989, entitled "The Conquistadors of Smallpox" - died last Friday, the 13th July. He had just celebrated his 88th birthday last month. Christopher was one of the three "Knights" who have given a talk to the Society. The last one was Harry Kroto, in Bordeaux, who spoke about Carbon 60. Christopher was knighted for his work, made an FRS and shared in 1996 the Nobel Prize for chemistry.

#### Royal Academy - Impressionsim Exhibition

London's Royal Academy is playing host to one of the finest collections of Impressionist paintings – by the likes of Monet, Manet, Renoir, Pissarro, Degas and Sisley – in the world. The Sterling and Francine Clark Art Institute in Williamstown, Massachusetts is currently undergoing major refurbishment. For the first time in its history ( it opened to the public in 1955), the core of its holdings of 19th-century French paintings is on loan to London's Royal Academy.
