The James Tudor Prize

The AFMS is most grateful to the James Tudor Foundation for its support.

The James Tudor Foundation was established in 2004. It makes grants for charitable purposes, usually in the UK, across six programme areas:

- Palliative care
- Medical Research
- Health education, awards and scholarship
- The direct relief of sickness
- The UK independent healthcare sector
- The fulfilment of charitable objects by other means

The AFMS received a grant enabling students to travel to the Mont St Michel meeting in 2007 to present medical topics and to compete for The James Tudor Foundation Prize. As part of its continuing support of the AFMS, six students, who have applied for and won bursary support, will be invited to attend and give a presentation at the next AFMS conference in Plymouth.

They will compete for The James Tudor Prize of £800.

Students must prepare a 15 minute presentation on any medical related topic (Clinical preferred but others considered.) The 15 minutes is to include any questions. Students can choose a presentation based just on an elective report but it may be a case presentation or study.

The AFMS would like to thank the James Tudor Foundation for their support.

The Will Reynish Prize

This prize is offered bi-annually by the Society to assist and encourage UK graduates of medicine at SHO or SPR level to spend some time in a medical capacity in France. The Society is able to give interested parties contact details in France, subject to speciality.

It is named after, and given in memory of, a former member of the Society, Dr William Reynish, who died whilst walking in the Pyrenees. William was an active member of the AFMS and was working in Toulouse at the time of his death.

The AFMS has now increased the Will Reynish Prize to £250. In return the winner will be asked to present at the British meeting. Also the AFMS has agreed to include all doctors.

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Chamonix Winter Conference Jan 31st to February 3rd 2008



Twenty delegates met at the "Hotel Aiguille du Midi", in Chamonix, Haute Savoie, France between the 31st January and 3rd February 2008. As before there was a UK meeting in which there were 4 presentations:

Dr. Janet Hall gave us an overview on the benefits and disadvantages of exercise, and most unusually, for such discussions, supported her talk with facts; we were delighted to learn that there are only 0.8 deaths per 100,000 marathon runners and one serious injury for every 350 hours of horseriding. New bindings and boots have reduced skiing injuries from 5-8 per 1000 skiing days to 2-3....important for the out-of-conference activities in Chamonix.







Dr. John Wilkinson brought us up to date with an EU study looking at the variation in health indicators in EU regions (as op-

posed to countries). Seventy three indicators are presently used to classify European regions and it will be fascinating to see how the EU Commission uses these data maybe to direct aid to areas not necessarily favoured by National Governments? Dr. Helen

Sykes and Mr. Andrew Forrester treated us to a double act that, whilst very enjoyable, was on the serious subject of Torture and its effects on shoulder function in Asylum Seekers. We were to learn that the methods used by the Catholic Church in centuries past have been refined by modern states only a little. Andy was ably supported in his demonstration of shoulder examination by a beautiful young model with intact shoulder function! Prof. Gareth Williams was unable to attend and his talk was replaced by one on the "Disaster of MMC" given by Dr. Colin Mumford. This led to a wide-ranging discussion on the merits of plan-

ning post-graduate medical training.. The main out-of-conference activities were, as one might perhaps expect, skiing and mountain walking in the gloriously beautiful Haute-Savoie.
